

BIOGRAPHY

There is a moment in a few careers when popularity becomes a tidal wave and sweeps a performer on to pre-eminence in romantic appeal. That moment arrived for Pierce Brosnan, a dashing, charming and talented Irishman, about mid-way through the first season of NBC's "Remington Steele" series. Suddenly the public and the media both caught on to the fact that Brosnan combined the dynamics of humor, almost shameless good looks, comedy timing and charm in a way that no one had since Cary Grant -- and "Remington Steele" shot out of obscurity and into the ranks of the ratings! leaders. Pierce was caught in the middle of the tidal wave and his popularity grew by leaps and bounds. Requests for him to appear on major magazine covers and readers' demands for stories on him became numerous. By the start of the second season of "Remington Steele" when 'TV Guide' featured him in a cover story on TV's most enchanting hunks, readers complained that Brosnan deserved better than to be lumped with TV's previous reigning superstars as a "hunk." People viewed Pierce in a different light. The top poster companies vied for the profitable honor of covering the nation's walls with him in the guise in which the populace had fallen for him...fully and elegantly attired. A photo of him in an impeccable dinner jacket could be the poster shot of the century, the experts figured.

Although athletic and cut in the heroic mold of Hollywood's most glittering leading man tradition, Brosnan disdained on-screen heroics and macho power for comedy timing and a kind of self-derisive style that, however alien to standard television fare, quickly over-powered a legion of fans that increased logorythmically each week. Pierce Brosnan, now identified as the next sensation to follow Steve McQueen, Clint Eastwood and Burt Reynolds from television stardom to international theatrical feature stardom, had paid his dues in learning his acting craft well before the tidal wave hit. He was well prepared, not only in appearance, but in talent and acting experience, as well.

Pierce Brosnan was born to May and Tom Brosnan in the town of Naven in County Meath, Ireland on May 16, 1953. He lived there until the age of 11 when his family moved to London, England. After high school, he went on to become a commercial artist, with no real intention of becoming an actor until he saw the play, "Antigone" and fell in love with acting. He began studying acting at the Drama Center in London and stayed there for three years, gradually growing into his craft. After school, he went straight into a job as an acting assistant stage manager (ASF) at the York Theatre Royal, and it was six months later that Tennessee Williams selected Pierce to create the role of McCabe in the British premiere of "Red Devil Battery Sign." Brosnan starred in other prestigious London stage productions such as Zeffirelli's "Filumena" and "Wait Until Dark." He received such rave reviews for his stage work that many people expected him to continue in the theatre. However, after a number of plays, he was offered his first television role in a docudrama called "Murphy's Stroke," based on a true event about the contemporary Irish racehorse, and he took it.

Pierce is no stranger to television, even in America. Previous to his casting as Remington Steele, he was seen as Rory Manion in the

critically acclaimed "The Manions of America," his first American job. Pierce received a warm welcome from the American critics, being hailed as "Ireland's greatest export" by some and honored by others for his "superb performance." Writer Agnes Nixon said of Pierce in "Manions": "The actor with the black-haired charm would turn the head of any lass, no matter how exhalted then or now. We're going to see a lot of Brosnan."

When "The Manions of America" was about to be screened in Hollywood, Pierce and his wife decided that it was a good opportunity to introduce himself personally to Hollywood. "I went to the bank manager and explained that I had all kinds of money coming in (which was totally untrue), and I was able to convince him to give us a few thousand dollars for our trip to America. We ended up at LAX and stayed with an agent recommended to me by my London agent. MTM was looking for someone to play Remington Steele at that time and they were the first people I saw in my lineup of meetings." After MTM's considerable search, Pierce captured the role of Reminggon Steele, a private investigator who is sophisticated, charming and frequently inept, always wittier than wise in the ways of detecting. Both Remington Steele and Pierce Brosnan take the most untraditional and totally winning roads to success.

Pierce Brosnan is a romantic at heart. His character evolved from a gigolo to something much closer to the actual Brosnan persona... a warm, caring, self-deriding and very funny young man. As Remington Steele, the bogus private eye, he is teamed with Laura Holt, played by Stephanie Zimablist. Pierce is excited about the prospects of "Remington" because it is his first experience in light comedy, although he was trained in arch British stage comedies. The series gives him an opportunity to play both the serious side and the comic side of the Steele character, a fact which has given theatrical film producers the chance to see his potential in almost every kind of role. "If I had the choice of seeing the best film or the best play, I would see the best film," the stage-trained actor observes. "I am transported when I watch a movie, and to me it's the greatest source of entertainment. There aren't very many films made in England, and this is one reason I have relished the idea of coming to the States for a long time."

Pierce Brosnan is a dedicated family man who derives and values great stability from his wife, children and home. Pierce is married to actress Cassandra Harris, a noted stage and screen performer who most recently starred in the James Bond picture, "For Your Eyes Only." They are the parents of two pre-teen children, Charlotte, born November 27, 1973, Christopher, born November 11, 1974 and recently welcomed a third child, Sean William on September 13, 1983. The Brosnans' also have another member in their family, their dog, Albert, who is half Dalmation and half Labrador Retreiver. They maintain homes in the Hollywood Hills and in Wimbledon, England. Pierce's growing popularity as well as his wife's, promise to keep them primarily ensconced in California. For exercise, Pierce swims regularly and, for relaxation, enjoys snooker, the English version of billiards, and the continuing practice of his talents as a painter.

What does the future hold for Pierce Brosnan? Besides "Remington Steele," he will be appearing in a thirteen-part television series

for PBS called "Nancy Astor" this spring. The program was originally filmed for the BBC in England and will give American viewers still another facet of Brosnan's talents. Nancy Astor was a pioneer, a Virginian who become the first lady of the British Parliament. Pierce ages fifty years in the production and plays Astor's first husband, a Bostonian. The extraordinary make-up was done by Christopher Tucker who did "The Elephant Man." Pierce has also just recently formed his own production company, Kilkenny Productions, and hopes to produce some movies in the near future. One possibility is a project dear to Pierce's wife, Cassie--a mini-series or film based on the diaries of her grandmother, a novelist and artist who married a German baron and was smuggled out to Australia in World War I.

Even though he has definitely and resoundingly conquered America, Pierce has achieved the further and rarer distinction of being honored in his own land. One of his proudest moments came when the staid and hard-to-impress "Times" of London heralded the arrival of "Remington Steele" to BBC Television with a rave review for him, ending with "Brosnan is divine." Who says you can't go home again?
