

PBFC: What was the most challenging role that you ever appeared in and why?

PBFC: Is it difficult for you to memorize the Remington Steele scripts so quickly?

PIERCE: When it comes to memorizing lines, I'm a fairly quick study. I start out the season pretty well, but as time goes on, my brain becomes a bit jaded and I just have to work extra hard. Basically, I'm an actor who worries about lines too much, I like to be word perfect.

PBFC: Have you ever appeared in a Shakespearean production?

PIERCE: Yes, I was in a Mid-Summer's Night Dream, I played Oberon. And then there was Macbeth, cheery little piece. I was just out of drama school and was cast as all the servants and made props. One of the props was a polystyrafoam club and when I hit Banquo over the head with it, it busted into a zillion little pieces all over the stage, but that's another story.

PBFC: Do you have plans to do commercials other than for MasterCard?
PIERCE: Not really, not for the

PBFC: Are you planning to make another appearance on the Tonight Show?

PIERCE: If they will have me back, I would like to do it.

PBFC: Did you ever act in a play at your high school?
PIERCE: No, never. I thought it was an absolute sissy's game. Really, I spent most of my time hanging out with tough guys and smoking cigarettes, a habit which I have since

given up.

PBFC: What is it that you find so intriguing about French history? PIERCE: I guess it's my love of French food.

PBFC: Who is your favorite men's clothing designer?
PIERCE: Georgio Armani.

PBFC: If you had continued with your art career, what field would you have gone into?

PIERCE: I wanted to design and illustrate covers for rock albums. That's what I was into at the time.

PBFC: What was it like working with Tennessee Williams?

PIERCE: Incredible, memorable. I've got a great photograph of the two of us together and a telegram that he sent me which I've got up on my wall that reads "Thank God for you my dear boy, Love, Tennessee Williams." One of the highlights of a career which is so far going quite well.

PBFC: Are any of your children going to be appearing in Remington Steele this season?

PIERCE: No, they're much too busy with school.

PBFC: Other than Remington Steele, what is your favorite T.V. show?
PIERCE: I just watch PBS really,
Masterpiece Theatre. They show all of the English programs and that's how I keep up on what my mates are doing back in England.

Remington . . . well here we are in the fourth season, never thought it would get this far, but low and behold . . . and they're already talking about the fifth season. The scripts this year are quite good and I have a rather nice attitude and feel for playing Remington. I usually do begin the season with a great energy, but doing episodic is a monster and it can really wear you down. So this year, rather than shooting for twenty-two weeks straight, we are going to be taking little hiatuses every four or five weeks, which I think is going to be much more civilized.

ust got back from London where we shot the first episode of Remington J Steele for the new season. It's going to be a two-hour opener and Cassie is appearing in it as Felicia, the character she played in the first season. London was fantastic, hadn't been back in three years. It was great seeing my mother and father and all of our English friends. While we were there, we went to see the tennis matches at Wimbledon, which incidentally, is my home town. We had our children, Christopher and Charlotte, with us and later that day we all trucked up to Wembley Stadium to see "The Boss" (Bruce Springsteen). He was bloody marvelous, absolutely dynamite. Although Wembley is humungous, he still managed to touch even the back rows-everybody was bopping, really had a good evening.

So, those were the highlights of London, with the exception of the ceiling falling in, which you may or may not have heard about. Cassie and I were due to start work the next morning at 6:00 a.m. on Remington Steele. We had been back and forth on the phone with both of our agents all evening and were also trying to make arrangements to get the children from Los Angeles to London. With the eight hour time difference between London and Los Angeles, we found ourselves absolutely exhausted and finally fell into bed at about 2:00 a.m. thinking, thank God, nothing else can go wrong. At 3:30 in the morning there was an almighty crash and all of this plaster came crashing down on the bottom part of the bed. We immediately jumped out of the bed and just as our

feet touched the floor, the rest of the bloody ceiling came down where our backs would have been along with this huge lead pipe. Cassie thought it was an earthquake and ran for the door . . . I don't know what I was thinking, but ran for the windows, and we bumped into each other in the middle of the room. It was completely dark, we switched on the lights, and suddenly all of this water came gushing down from the floor above, which is where my mother and father were sleeping. Before I knew it, Dad and I were climbing out on the ledge of the house and just then the fire brigade arrived. It could have been a really nasty thing, but we're all alive and kicking . . . thank God.


That's all I can say on that matter. It will be released, when it will be released, I still don't know.

As far as upcoming appearances are concerned, I'm really trying to cool that out for the moment. I just want to concentrate on Remington Steele and not spread myself so thin that I find I'm completely exhausted with no time for the family.

I was quite flattered when they asked me, as the men that have followed before were the likes of Johnny Carson and Walter Matthau. The magazine just came out this week and is getting great response. Also, my son Sean and I are featured in a book on teddy bears which was done by a good friend of mine, Nancy Ellinson. The large picture of Sean and I in the last chronicles issue was from that photo session and we'll let you know when that book will be ready for release.
